Board Approves Four-Year Strategic Framework

Northwest ISD will embark on updated core beliefs, vision, mission and strategic goals after months of receiving community and staff input. At the Strategic Summit, more than 100 participants, including students, were chosen to represent the voice for values and desires for students' education. The feedback was supportive of the current direction of the district, with an emphasis on developing the "whole child," while emphasizing the importance of personalized learning opportunities.

Guiding Our Future

The support and guidance from the Northwest ISD Board of Trustees has provided for and set the future-ready path for NISD students. Board members set clear expectations and promote excellence for students by setting goals, reviewing policies and procedures and serving the best interests of NISD students and staff. School board members are elected to a three-year term of office, on a 2-2-3 rotating basis. Seats are filled during the May election and members are elected at-large. Personalized, Meaningful Opportunities



It is Northwest ISD's goal that students will achieve success through meaningful learning experiences, innovative pathways, and personalized learning opportunities. NISD's commitment to continuous learning throughout the K-12 experience and beyond is essential to prepare students for college and career opportunities.

Anytime, Anywhere Learning

Northwest ISD students use ePortfolios as a way to show rigorous academics and multidimensional interpretations of learning. Students are using their ePortfolio to reflect on work, share with a safe audience, apply for college, and showcase themselves in a way that goes beyond numeric grades. In January 2018, Northwest ISD began incorporating ePortfolio links on the report card, taking the next step toward integrating them into the learning and assessment process.

Hard Work Pays Off

Many students possess a desire to go to college and the willingness to work hard, but do not truly have the opportunity to be college ready. These are often the students who will be the first in their families to attend college. AVID Secondary equips teachers and schools with what they need to help these students succeed on a path to college and career success. The AVID Elective course meets daily, and students learn study skills, organization skills, questioning strategies and other academic strategies such as socratic seminars, philosophical chairs, Cornell note taking, public speaking and close reading strategies. As students advance in the program, they will have assistance with college applications, SAT/ACT preparations, financial aide applications, applying for scholarships and submitting college applications. More than 600 students benefit from AVID in Northwest ISD.

Building a strong root system is essential to the career tree. We encourage students to use their portfolio to document their professional skills and what they have done each day to get themselves one step closer to their career goals.

NISD Opens New Schools, Prepares for Growth



By 2027-28, NISD is projected to enroll 37,220. Current enrollment is 23,081.

In August 2018, NISD opened the district's 18th elementary school, Lizzie Curtis, and the district's sixth middle school, Leo Adams. Adams is located in north Fort Worth, near Eaton High School and Schluter Elementary School. Curtis, also located in Fort Worth, is south of Bonds Ranch Road in the Hawthorne Meadows subdivision. There are more than 75 future or active housing developments in Northwest ISD, and much of the growth can be seen in the southern portion of the district near Haslet and the northern portion near Northlake.

Our community passed a \$399 million bond election in May 2017 providing for an additional 7,000 student seats, safety and security updates, technology upgrades and more. Construction is taking place at Lance Thompson Elementary School, the district's 19th elementary school, located in the Harvest neighborhood off FM 407 in Northlake. The campus features the district's new prototype design with collaboration spaces and a Makerspace area incorporated into the learning commons/library and will open in August 2019. 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NISD Saves Millions in Energy Dollars

NISD has been named an "Outstanding Sustainable K-12 School" in Texas for exemplary achievement contributing to clean air through energy efficiency and education-based renewable energy projects. The district continutes to retrofit all outside lighting to LED technology – yielding an annual savings of \$118,591. NISD is focused on reducing the usage of electricity and water. In the past 10 years, NISD has saved more than \$5.5 million through our energy management program.

We Value Our Staff!

NISD is known as a leading model across the nation for its personalized learning opportunities designed to create an environment that is rewarding for educators. This year, the district held its first job fair with more than 180 in attendance. As a fastgrowth school district, NISD greets more than 1,200 new students each year and roughly 400 new teachers.

NISD provides an on-site Employee Health and Wellness Center staffed with a physician and certified clinical medical assistants for staff and their dependents.

It Takes a Village

Northwest ISD believes the shared responsibility of students, families, schools and communities is critical to the success of each child. Establishing an environment where the community is engaged and informed leads to increased support and improvement in student learning.

NISD launched a marketing and advertising program as a way to generate revenue to the school district, as well as assist local business partners with a way to promote their companies through avenues such as the district's stadium, enewsletters, website and more.
